
getting free swag, and if you're lucky, a means to free room and board for a few days.

NEVERWARE



Founded by Jonathan Hefter, a Penn 2009 grad, Neverware is a small year old startup of only seven people trying to change the world of education.

How? By using a process called virtualization, which allows one computer to pretend to be another.

In this case, Neverware is using virtualization to make old computers run new software. The old computers become "thin clients," which means they only act as input device (the keyboard) and output (the display) for the new software. The old computers do not even need a hard drive.

This is groundbreaking news for schools. As Hefter explained it,

schools are constantly on a cycle of replacing old computers with new ones. These costs only grow with time as schools attempt to keep up with new technologies.

With Neverware, however, schools can save thousands of dollars to keep their computers operating like new. With just one of their machines (called Juiceboxes) can make 50 old computers run like new.

The biggest problem that they have is getting schools to believe that it works. But with a brief demonstration, schools sign up for the service immediately.

Neverware already has contracts with ten schools in the New York area and are working on expanding their reach and company.

Romotive is trying to change that by using smartphones (which most people already have) as the robot's brain. The smartphone then does all the complex computing that makes robots so expensive. Right now Romo (the name given to their first robot) is just a base but one can easily imagine the kinds of extensions that could be added on to the robot.

Romotive is also hoping to have Romo teach kids learn how to program.
